Dear Parent/Carers,

What a difference the weather is making - I was beginning to think that it was never going to stop raining!

With the more clement weather, comes more opportunities for Learning Outside the Classroom (LOTG) and children have been enjoying the chance to contextualise their learning, making it both more engaging and easier to commit to long term memory, through a variety of activities. Alongside these, Year Groups have also had their Impact Days, which have covered a range of topics from Farming to the Spanish Conquistadors (there may be a test on that later!) We also had our Dress to Impress Day, our Diversity Day and of course, no school year would be complete without it, Red Nose Day. All of these days provide fantastic platforms, from which many new learning opportunities can be initiated and which all the children have thoroughly enjoyed. Each consultation will last for 10 minutes, and you will be able to book these directly online, using the already school established, SCOPAY App. I'm sure many of you will have already had experience of these video calls, as many of our Secondary Schools are already using them. As with all systems, there are Pro's and Con's - as previously explained, hopefully it will allow you a greater degree of flexibility around attending, without having to leave your home or work place, or your tea on the stove, as well as focussing the conversation within a 10-minute time slot. A possible down-side, is that when the 10 minutes is up, you are automatically and instantly cut-off, possibly leaving you with unanswered questions. If you do feel that this has happened, please feel free to contact the member of staff, via the school office, and they will be happy to call you, to carry on the conversation, at a mutually convenient time.

I will end by sending our collective congratulations to Mrs Tozer on the birth of her baby daughter, Evelyn, on the 25<sup>th</sup> February. Both are fit and healthy and we look forward to meeting Evelyn for the first time when she visits the school.

Thank you as always for your continued support.

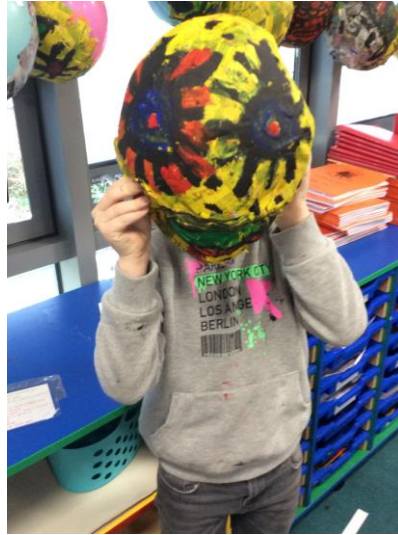
School breaks up for the Easter Holidays on Friday 8<sup>th</sup> April at the normal time.

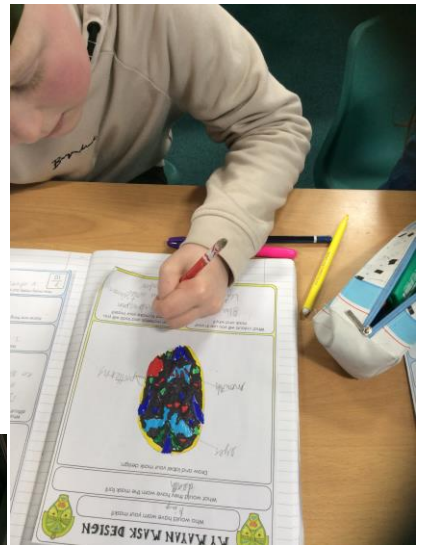
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# MAYAN IMPACT DAY
